SADDLEWORTH SHOW

Our stand at Saddleworth Show this year was graced by the presence of the Chairman of Saddleworth .Parish Council, Councillor Betty Boon and the Chairman of the Campaign for True Identity, Mr. Geoff Hoyle, when the rose "Saddleworth" was presented by Mr. Frank Ashton, BBC radio gardening expert, to Councillor Boon, who accepted it on behalf of Saddleworth Parish Council. Councillor Boon subsequently planted the rose in St Chads Park.

A great deal of interest was shown in our stand and we again acquired new members, plus the autograph, on one of our membership forms of "Gina" barmaid from the TV programme "Heartbeat" who was the celebrity of the Show.

A very limited number of the "Saddleworth" rose will be available for sale late October/early November. A price for these has not yet been decided, though this is not likely to be excessive. However, it is expected that demand will far exceed supply in this first year and so we therefore ask those of you who are not fortunate enough to acquire one this year, please be patient, we expect to have a plentiful supply next year, when the bud grafting process has got into full swing.

The individuals and organisations who made donations to the White Rose Project, plus the raffle winners (two) are to be given first option. After which orders will be taken in strict rotation as received.

YORKSHIRE DAY

As previously advertised, Yorkshire Day was celebrated on 30 July this year, instead of 01 Aug, in order to hold the event on a Sunday.
