### King George V Playing Field, Saddleworth.

## Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> August 2009

Each year the Yorkshire Day event in Saddleworth has got better and better with more and more visitors and this year looks like it will be no exception. However, it was with great sadness that we heard that Mr Brian Oddy, the Red Tailed Hawk demonstrator had passed away earlier this year.

The event will commence as usual at Saddleworth Museum at 11.00 am. The Chairman of SWRS Mr Geoff Bayley will introduce the Chair of Saddleworth Council Cllr Mrs Alma McInnes the Chairman of the Yorkshire Ridings Society, Cllr Chris Abbott and Ms Doreen Ainscough of Friends of Real Lancshire. Mr Gilbert Symes will read the Yorkshire Declaration at 11.34 am.

The parade from the museum to King George V playing field will begin approximately 12.00 noon, headed by Mr Oliver Benson carrying the Yorkshire flag then the Councillors and other dignitaries, the Saddleworth Branch RBL, Diggle Band and Saddleworth Detached Flight 2200 Squadron ATC and "Captain" the beautifully decorated Shire horse.

The playing field will be set up for the event by about 10.00am and cups of Yorkshire tea etc. will be available on the SWRS stand and at the Canal boat.

The Agricultural/livestock section will include sheep shearing, dry stone walling, llamas, domestic poultry, goat milking display, childrens pet show, Ferret Rescue and pony rides. The National Trust and Janette will have plant stalls.

There will be food available from Mann's Wharf Catering, Home Bake, the Cheese stall, Grandpa Green's Ice Cream stall and the Chocolate stall.

Entertainment will be provided by Fiddle and Feet with Kayan, Irish and Spanish dancing, The Brenda Goddard School of Dancing, Marsden Belly Dancers, giant bubble blowing clowns, Barbers Shop Quartet with hair cutting available if required, the Bouncy Castle, a pea-shooting competition and a shove halfpenny competition, Pig Racing, Duck Racing, Face Painting and Tombola.

Stalls and displays will be by Saddleworth Council's, Chairman's Charity, Samantha Jones Trust, the Quilters, African jewellery, YCW second hand book stall, Bri-a-Brac, Pause a Second, Rag Ruggers, hand made cards, Yorkshire flags, caps, Saddleworth tee shirts etc. on the SWRS stand and much more.

# An Eventful First Year for Saddleworth's Air Cadets

The last twelve months have proved eventful for Saddleworth's new Air Cadet unit. Formed as a Detached Flight of 2200 (Oldham) Squadron of The Air Training Corps in May 2008, the unit started with a dozen Cadets parading at Diggle Band Club. These cadets have taken part in some of the wide variety of activities that the Air Training Corps can offer. Cadets have been sailing and power-boating at TS Palatine, the Sea Cadet training centre at Hollingworth Lane; visited The Defence College of Aeronautical Engineering at Cosford; been flying at the Royal Air Force Station at Woodvale; taken part in a weekend field-craft exercise; and are preparing to go on their first week long annual camps at Royal Air Stations this Force Special mention must go to Cadet Sergeant Arron Frost, of Springhead, who completed his Gliding

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Scholarship and was presented with Silver Glider Pilot's Wings for flying solo; and to Cadet Warrant Officer Michael Kostecky of Diggle, who successfully completed his Staff Cadet examinations, earning him a BTEC Certificate in Aviation Studies - equivalent to 2 GCSEs A-C grades. The Detached Flight has competed against Squadrons in the East Lancashire Wing of The Air Training Corps, in sport and other events, finishing 16th of 23 in their first Wing Training Day competition. The Detached Flight now has over 30 cadets, and extra accommodation, in the form of a Porta-cabin is being provided by the Reserve Forces and Cadet Association. The Flight is applying to become a Squadron in its own right, and will hopefully be resurrecting the old Saddleworth Squadron number of 1848 which was last used in the 1940s. #### **Memorial to Colin Holt**

The late Colin Holt was instrumental in forming the Yorkshire Ridings Society following local government re-organisation in 1974. He continued to promote the identity of Yorkshire and his beloved Ridings until his death in 2006

There was a period when Collin allowed his telephone to be 'cut off' rather than accept accounts which were 'incorrectly addressed'.

Recently I attended the unveiling of a plaque and the planting of three white rose bushes in memory of Collin. The event took place in Collin's home village of Fenwick which is a small remote village yet only a few miles north of Doncaster. One of the two roads into the village is so quiet that to cross the main railway level crossing involves ringing a bell to summon an attendant to open the gates!

Those arriving for the ceremony met for refreshments in the local pub, before walking several hundred yards to the 'Pinfold' where the ceremony was to be held. The Pinfold is now the name of the memorial garden owned by the people of the village of Fenwick. Fenwick is one of the few remaining villages in England to have 'Village Meetings' and elects two representatives (members) to Moss & District Parish Council of which Collin had been a member. The Pinfold was originally an enclosed area of land in which the Village Pinder used to impound stray animals in days gone by, until redeemed by their owner on payment of a penalty. It is also the home of the local war memorial.

Present at the Pinfold were Collin's Widow Hillary, Members of the Parish Council, Members of YRS and Friends of Real Lancashire who were led by Dave Russell carrying the new Lancashire flag. There were plenty of Yorkshire flags too!

A commemorative plaque was attached to the wall of the Pinfold by Roger Sewell, and three white rose bushes were planted, each representing one of the three Ridings. The West Riding was represented by a Saddleworth rose.

#### **Home Town Identity**

It was reported in the local media that a Councillor from one of the towns in the borough wanted to include his home town 'cote of arms' on the Metropolitan Borough notepaper. Unfortunately he was denied permission to do this.

It is quite understandable that many people wish to recognise their home town identity, after all they are part of the borough and not part of Oldham, regardless of the name given to the Borough.

Whatever the Borough Council and Council executives wish to call themselves the council is a joint council. It is a council shared between the seven townships of the Borough.

The Borough is simply an administrative area like Tameside and Kirklees, it is not a town. The towns are Chadderton, Failsworth, Lees, Oldham, Royton, Saddleworth and Shaw & Crompton and they have their own boundaries within the Borough.

The town of Oldham has it's own boundaries and makes up less than three sixteenths of the Borough. Each town, including Oldham has it's own proud heritage and none of them should be treated as a suburb or satellite of another town.

To use the name of one of the townships as the name of the Borough is both misleading and confusing. The only real way forward is to use a title or prefix for the Borough which is properly acceptable to all seven towns such as for example "Medlock", the name of the river which runs almost through the centre of the Borough, or some other generic title. An effort has to be made to respect the identity of all the townships in an equal manner. Roy Bardsley sec SWRS
